

"For scientific leadership, give me Scott; for swift and efficient travel, Amundsen; but when you are in a hopeless situation, when there seems no way out, get down on your knees and pray for Shackleton."

As an aspiring explorer in the early 20th century, Sir Ernest Shackleton had been a member of several expeditions. Now he was ready to embark on the most daring adventure yet: a land-crossing of the Antarctic.

Endurance: Shackleton's Incredible Voyage (1959), by Alfred Lansing, details the staggering and true story of a band of twenty-eight men who precariously clung to ice packs after their ship was crushed by floes. Shackleton's brilliance kept his crew alive through subzero temperatures, furious blizzards, polar nights, and the huge waves of Drake Passage until rescue finally arrived months later.

Lansing writes the gripping adventure with the distance of a researcher, but his masterful storytelling keeps the reader gasping at each turn of a page.

Learning from the Holocaust

While school may have been closed for Presidents' Day, Honors Government students took advantage of the free time to visit the Museum of Tolerance. We were privileged to hear two survivors speak.

The first was Harry David who was too young to remember his experience, but learned of it after the war. Born in Holland, Harry was blond, fair-skinned, and blue-eyed. When the NAZIs invaded in 1940, he was just 18 months old. Neighbors took him in to hide him from the Germans. Resistance fighters later smuggled him to the countryside where he was reunited with an uncle after the war.

Born in Hungary, Agnes Kun, the second survivor, was 18 years old in 1944 when the NAZIs forced her family into Auschwitz Birkenau. While Dr. Mengele selected her family to die in the ovens, Agnes worked in Birkenau's show clinic where her cousin, a doctor, kept her safe by employing her as a nurse. She was liberated by Americans in 1945.

new people and then having to spend every minute with them was a bit frightening. As soon as we arrived, students were divided into "Family Groups" and sent off for our first group sessions. When I walked into my assigned cabin to

meet the Hopi Family Group, I looked around and felt a sudden tightness in my stomach: I didn't recognize a single face. My group was diverse, with students from many different Adventist schools and even public school students who came to Bible Camp with their local churches.



By God's grace, we clicked instantly. Over the next two days, our discussions ranged from our struggles in school to struggles in faith. Knowing that we all understood one another, we were not afraid to open up about our inner battles. "Does God accept me?" "Can He hear me?" "How can people be so sure God is there?" Discovering common weaknesses in faith helped us to grow together as we searched for guidance, comfort, and strength in the Bible. Before leaving for our dorm rooms, we exchanged hugs and "good nights." Somehow we had already became a family.

One of the most faith-strengthening experiences I had at Bible Camp was in the "Prayer Oasis." I attended the session with a friend from my Hopi Family group. In the Oasis, there were several different stations set up to focus on specific prayer needs--praying for others, praying for a closer walk with God, and speaking to Him about life,



rather than listing "wants." Before we knew it, my friend and I had spent almost two and a half hours in the "Prayer Oasis." We had completely blocked out all distractions and focused on our individual relationship with God. Fully opening our lines of communication with Him, we finally felt our relationships strengthening along with our faith. As we were leaving, my friend suddenly hugged me, and we knew that the Lord had touched both of our hearts that day.

Already a month later, my family group and I make it a point to connect with each other daily, and to let our friends know that we are praying for them. By making my path cross with a new group of friends, God has provided me with an additional support system for my walk with Him.



Bible camp taught me that God doesn't mean for us to take this journey alone. He will bring people into our lives who will follow the path of His will with us. Solomon, in Ecclesiastes 4:9-10, reminds us that "two are better than one because they have a good return for their labor. For if either of them falls, the one will lift up his companion."

I leave for college in just a few months, and, knowing that I will be "on my own" so soon has increased my desire to work on my faith and my personal relationship with God. My Bible Camp experience helped me realize that my I had not made enough of an effort to include God in my everyday life. Now, I have made the decision to begin this next chapter with Him as my guide and as my goal.

Then they take a tenquestion, multiple-choice, open-note quiz over the essay's content. Each correct answer rewards the applicant with one entry into the scholarship; an applicant can earn a maximum of ten entries. Ten winners are randomly selected. # Gift of Education: Update

In December 2014, the National Honor Society of Glendale Adventist Academy, with the help of their family and friends, raised enough money to send 16 children to Feed and Read schools in Cambodia for both Cambodian and Vietnamese students. Many of the children had been working full-time recycling garbage in the Phnom Penh city dump. The students, now fully equipped with school uniforms, shoes, backpacks, and classroom supplies, started school this January.



The Feed and Read Schools not only make it possible for children living in slums to access education, but also introduces students, parents, and the community around the schools to Christianity. Through the work of the Holy Spirit, in Phnom Penh alone, the program has resulted in more than 70 baptisms and about 100 children regularly attending Sabbath services.

Adventist Southeast Asia Project (ASAP) plans to incorporate



vocational training programs for older students. But, for now, the schools are focused on developing basic reading, writing, and arithmetic skills that will enable graduates to find better jobs and will help them pursue higher education.

We at ASAP wish to extend our sincerest thanks to GAA for helping make education and a better future possible for these children.

## Sofia Kovalesvskaya

Russian-born Sofia Kovalevskaya (1850-1891) was the first European woman to earn a doctorate in mathematics. Her greatest contributions to the field were her concept about partial differentiation involving time derivatives and free surfaces and her theory about the rotation of a solid body around a fixed point.

Fascinated by calculus and trigonometry from a young age, she determined to pursue studies in a field mostly closed to women at the time. Sofia published many papers and shared theories about math and science, many of which were originally rejected--not because they lacked merit--but because the author was female.

Her astounding understanding of mathematical concepts helped shape current theories on differentiation, integration, calculus, and physics.

Her work did not stop there. She also became an advocate for the rights of women to seek higher education.
